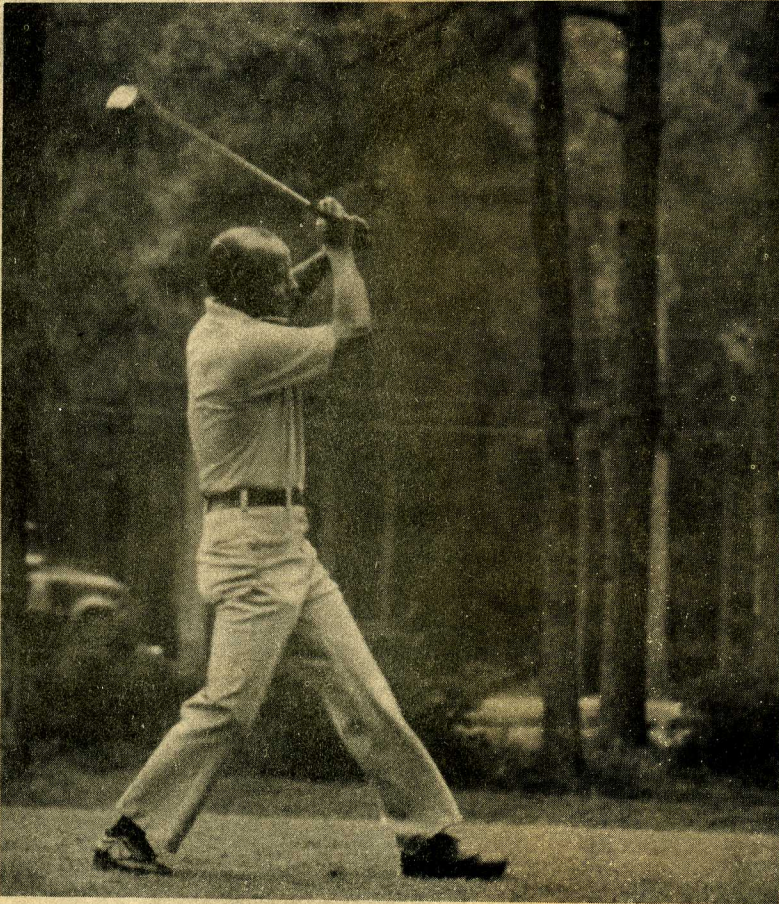

CARL F. PINN

Carl Francis Pinn was born in Lynchburg, Virginia on October 3rd, 1911, the second son and third child of the late Samuel Houston and Rose White Pinn. He departed this life on July 19, 1981 in Leesburg, Virginia. He is survived by his wife, Anne Chambers Pinn, one daughter, Dr. Vivian W. Pinn of Boston, Mass., two sisters, Mrs. Melvina Taylor of Lynchburg and Mrs. Geraldine Oldham of Tuskegee, Ala., one brother, Melvin Pinn, Sr. of Lynchburg, and a host of other relatives and friends.

Carl Pinn attended Lynchburg Public Schools, graduating from Dunbar High School in the Class of 1929. He attended Virginia Seminary and College and graduated from West Virginia State College. He began his teaching career in 1935 in a one-room school house in Naruna, Virginia, but the following year moved to Halifax where he taught Physical Education, History and Science. It was during this time that he met and married the late Francena Evans, and from this union had one daughter, Vivian Winona.

In 1942, he returned to Lynchburg and Dunbar High School to teach Physical Education and later served as chairman of the Physical Education Department. He initiated the Varsity Tennis Program at Dunbar, and also served as assistant varsity coach of both football and basketball. He organized Dunbar's Gymnastics program. In 1970, he helped to coordinate the Driver Education program at E.C. Glass as well as Dunbar High School. Carl Pinn took great pride in the fact that he played a major role in the merging of physical activities and health education at Dunbar. On numerous other occasions he served the Lynchburg Public School system as an advisor on textbook adoption. He completed his 40-year teaching career when he retired in June, 1975.

In addition to his teaching, he also served for many years as a Supervisor of Recreation for the City of Lynchburg, teaching hundreds of Black youth and adults swimming, tennis, and ball sports of all types. After his retirement, he enjoyed, through the final day of his life, engaging in the sport of golf through which he found peace and fulfillment.

He was a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, the Revelers Club, the Virginia Senior Citizens Gold Club and was a Connecting Link. He also held memberships in the Lynchburg Education Association, the Virginia Education Association, and the National Educational Association. He was a former member of the Board of Directors of the Hunton YMCA.

His religious roots were planted in the Eighth Street Baptist Church. During most of his adult life, he was extremely active in the Good Shepard Episcopal Church, serving both as superintendent of the Sunday School and on the Vestry. His way of life always reflected his deep spiritual nature.

Carl Pinn will be remembered because of his respect and love for all people regardless of their profession or their lack of one; remembered for his love of sports and good sportsmanship; remembered for his willingness to help anyone in a friendly and caring spirit. He always championed the cause of those less fortunate than he, of those who lacked the physical gifts that were his, and of those who simply needed direction to their lives. Most of all, he will be forever remembered as a loving and caring husband, a most exemplary father, and a friend to all.
