Describe in detail regulations governing the operation of the Suzmer School

We follow the regulations of the State Department in regard to Summer School:

- 1. The school is administered by regular personnel having all qualifications necessary for approval in the regular program
- 2. One hundred and sixty hours of instruction are required for one unit of work
- 3. Library and laboratory facilities are available
- 4. The same standards are required in summer work as are required during the regular school year
- 5. Pupils may not earn more than one unit in new work
- 6. A small tuition fee (\$25.00) is charged
- 7. Teachers are paid at regular rate of pay. The difference is supplied by the School Board.
